FFEC WAS FOUNDED WITH A STRONG COMMITMENT TOWARDS SOCIAL JUSTICE & GRASSROOTS ENGAGEMENT TO EMPOWER MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES.

I had moved to the US for higher studies but always wanted to give back to the country and community I grew up in. In 2015 I took a break from my corporate career as a senior digital product strategist in the Silicon Valley, California and joined Jamia Millia Islamia (JMI) as a consultant to help establish the Centre for Innovation and Entrepreneurship(CIE) and improve JMI's on-campus placement record.

My one year at JMI brought me touch with youth from varied backgrounds of religion, class and caste. Since I was living on campus it gave me an opportunity to spend a lot of time with them at CIE, the Placement Centre and even after classes, hanging out around the guest houses or at Dr Tasneem Meenai's office of Student Welfare as students prepared posters for the Annual JMI Youth Festival Miraas.

This gave me an insight into the aspirations, dreams and concerns of young and dynamic Indians, particularly those from small towns of Northern India. When I moved to India I had thought of working with an existing organization but after discussions with a few organizations and advice and encouragement from people who knew about my passion for social justice, I decided to register a new one - I have been part of organizations and movements working on issues ranging from domestic violence to fundraising and peace in South Asia. Post 911 I joined organizations collaborating with student groups at Stanford University, UC Berkeley and many community colleges to organize events and bring awareness of the impact of ongoing wars.

FFEC started its first project on a rather ambitious note in Kaman, Mewat, rated as one of the most backward areas in India. I had come across Younus bhai at JMI whose taxi I often rented to travel to Al Hira Public School in Dasna, Ghaziabad that was founded by my father. On one of our drives he started talking about his village in Mewat and how underdeveloped it was and that it would greatly benefit from any intervention.





I took up his offer and soon his younger brother, Maqsood Khan, an ex-JMI graduate from Mass Communications arranged for a field trip to Kaman. After a few visits I decided to register FFEC as a non-profit organization under the Companies Act with Maqsood as a co-Director with the objective of building grassroots leadership in communities we work with so that they can take ownership and further empower their communities.

Thanks to Maqsood we were able to have meetings(chaupals) with the different sections of the community to understand and identify the most important issues for them. We met with members of panchayat, youth, older generation, women and visited schools, unmaintained and deserted health clinics, and farm fields with women working. Since lack of water was an important issue, we arranged for Aakar Foundation's team to visit and research **the possibility of developing check dams**.

After three months of frequent day trips and extensive field research, I took a step back and realized it was not practical or realistic to work in Mewat without first knowing and building the trust of the community. Due to lack of funds and human resources it was not possible to continue working there and I decided to return to Kaman after FFEC had gained some experience and had secured funds.

While chatting with domestic workers in the society I was living in, in Mayur Vihar, it occurred to me that all the sweepers, maids, electricians, plumbers came from **Trilokpuri**. They were from diverse religious, cultural and caste backgrounds. Trilokpuri with a population of two lakhs, spread across 36 blocks and 5 unauthorized areas(jhuggis), is like a mini-India with significant minority and migrant population from many different states. I began conducting focus groups with people living there, particularly women and decided to start work here.

We started by establishing our Children's Learning Center, Kadam in Block 32 near Ambedkar Camp(jhuggies) in summer of 2016 after a field research led by Asrar Jeelani with Kashif Abdullah and Arham Shamsi. Akbar, popularly known as Raja bhai who had just completed his Bachelor's degree became our first educator from the Many people community. from the community had suggested his name during the field survey as someone passionate about teaching kids. He has come a long way since then and now runs all operations on the ground.



THE MAIN OBJECTIVE OF KADAM IS TO OFFER KIDS A SAFE SPACE, WHERE THEY CAN LEARN TO THINK CRITICALLY, BE CREATIVE AND EXPRESS THEMSELVES. The main objective of Kadam is to offer kids living in small homes a safe space, learn to think critically, be creative and express themselves. **Given Trilokpuri's history of communal violence inculcating tolerance, respect for other religions, educating about communal harmony and their rights as citizens have been important goals of FFEC.**

We also focus on strengthening reading skills and Mathematics. We found that most kids are unable to read which makes it difficult to understand any subject. Leadership workshops, training in spoken English and preparation for board and college exams are also activities we have been doing consistently. We hire all our educators from Trilokpuri since they are committed to their community's betterment and it helps in building young leaders.

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Besides education, we have worked with women on projects ranging from helping Shahnaz set up her own sewing center, workshops with adolescent girls on feminine hygiene, nutrition and their rights by partnering with other organizations. WE HAVE WORKED WITH WOMEN ON PROJECTS RANGING FROM HELPING SHAHNAZ SET UP HER OWN SEWING CENTER, WORKSHOPS WITH GIRLS.



Our model is based largely on a needs basis and like many other organizations, **during the Covid lockdowns we distributed food, groceries and supported a community led kitchen with the help of volunteers from the community.** Each time we wrapped up our ration distribution program we heard requests for help with income generation since many of the daily wagers like waste pickers(kabaadiwalas), small shopkeepers, vegetable vendors, painters, rickshaw pullers lost their means of earning. It was to address these demands so that they could get back on their feet that we launched an income generation program, Rozgaar.

Engagement with young educators, college and university students for internships and fellowships prompted us to begin **webinar series** on topics of interest to youth. It was an idea suggested by a fellow, Arbab Ali and has been very successful. Our first series was on young women and we are currently having a three part **series on Climate Change**. We shall continue this initiative to discuss relevant issues and how we can collaborate with other established organizations.

FFEC continues to run on a string-shoe budget through personal donations. We could not have completed this 6 years journey without the hard work of our team on the ground, support of students from different colleges in Delhi, volunteers, advisors, well wishers, the local community, partner organizations and our donors.

We look for your continued support as we begin a new year with the hope of better health, freedom, peace and harmony!

FOOD Distribution


We were there when the community needed us the most. We distributed rations to almost 400 families with the help of around 25 community volunteers, Trilokpuri groups and Rahat foundation in over 6 rounds during the second wave of lockdown. We catered to homes of widows, or homes with no bread earner. The Kadam learning centre was converted into a distribution centre.



ROZGAAR

Pandemic came as a blow to the people who lost their means of livelihood. We believed that a little support from our end could help them stand on their feet. We provided microloans of around 50k to various individuals to sustain their businesses.





KADAM Learning Centre

We imparted reading and writing skills to the kids in the Trilokpuri slum. We conducted Maths classes for kids everyday which was divided into three sessions with 15-20 kids in each batch. We also re-started the coaching for 12th board exams and started coaching for 11th grade students.






We conducted workshops with women on health and nutrition. More than 100 women and young girls attended the sessions.

Mothers are superheroes indeed and one stays among us. She is profoundly known as Ammaji, a widow who is 70yrs old and a mother of 2 sons. Unfortunately, she lost a son a while back who was the only bread earner in the family. The other son is 45 years old who used to be an auto driver but he lost his vision and is not keeping well. He is now dependent upon his mother. She used to sustain herself and her son by asking for support from her extended families and neighbourhood. But the pandemic came as a hit for her. We as an organisation supported her financially and also provided ration to their home.

We observed this issue in various homes where widows were finding it difficult to bring food to the table as their husbands were the bread earners of the family. Supply of ration helped them sustain themselves for sometime and currently we are working on projects which will provide them with sustainable livelihood.

A waste picker from Trilokpuri. He is the only bread earner in his family. During the lockdown he lost his means of livelihood. The organisation helped him come back to his feet by granting him a small loan of Rs 10,000 to buy a rickshaw again to collect recyclable waste. Now he is able to earn his daily living and support his family.



FFEC hired me as a physiotherapist for Alam about 7 months ago. He could not move his left arm or fingers due to nerves damaged in the shoulder from a serious injury more than a year ago. He needed help dressing up. Slowly with daily physiotherapy therapy his arm, wrist and fingers' movement started improving and his muscle strength is returning. He is much better mentally also and has started doing errands such as painting his home. He may not be able to do the work he was doing earlier of loading and unloading goods for an export company but can atleast start something new.



But after coming here I am able to understand the basics. I want to become a teacher after I grow up. My teacher guides me well about the future prospects and my goals.

My name is Arpita. I live in Trilokpuri. I am studying in grade IX. Earlier I didn't use to know things. But after being a part of this organization I have started learning new things. They teach us very well. They engage us in a lot of activities. They were a great support in the lockdown. I am able to share my personal issues with them. They are a great support to me whenever I am stuck in life.
